Devon's 2022 Operating & Capital Budget

Devon Council has approved the 2022 Operating & Capital Budgets at their December 13, 2021, Council Meeting with a 3.90% municipal tax increase for 2022.

For a household with a median assessed value of \$305,000, the estimated impact of a 3.90 per cent tax increase is about \$71.97 per year or \$6.00 per month. Property assessments are based on the market value of a property as of July 1 of the previous year.

Highlights in the 2022 Budgets include:

- Debenture costs for the new ball diamonds development and paving of Range Road 262
- Extension of Michigan Street to Highway 19
- Installation of new solar crosswalks
- Replacement of Fire/Rescue Engine (cost shared 50/50 with Parkland County)
- Funding for the continuation of RVA Trail East (cost shared 1/3 with RVA & Federal Government)
- Maintaining reserve transfers for the future of Town facilities

The final municipal tax rate will be approved in May 2022 and tax notices will be mailed out to Devon property owners on May 31 with payment due June 30, 2022.

2022 Utility Budget

Along with the municipal tax increase for 2022, Council passed Devon's 2022 utility rates that went into effect on Jan. 1, 2022, with a small increase to sewer & bulk water rates and zero increases to water, municipal solid waste and natural gas

Water Rate (no change from 2021)

- Basic Monthly Charge: \$13.46
- Commodity Charge: \$1.55 per cubic metre

Sewer Rate (increase of 4.65% for 2022)

- Basic Monthly Charge: \$35 per month
- Commodity Charge: \$1.85 per cubic

Natural Gas Rate (no change from 2021)

- Basic Monthly Charge: \$35 per month
- Distribution Charge: \$1.57 per GJ

Solid Waste & Recycling Rate (no change)

 Monthly Charge for Weekly Pickup: \$30 per month

Bulk Water Rate (Up \$0.25/m3 for 2022)

\$5.00 per cubic metre

Understanding your Town Utility Bill

With the recent increase in the price of natural gas, combined with the extremely cold weather in December and January, residents received higher-than-average utility bills this month. The good news is that the cost of natural gas has dropped dramatically in January and will be around the \$4/GJ rate.

$\label{thm:continuous} \textbf{To help residents better understand their utility bill, each line on the bill is outlined below.}$

Natural Gas Utility

- Supplier Cost: This is the variable rate set by the current natural gas market that the Town of Devon pays to its supplier Gas Alberta per GJ of natural gas used. The Town does not control this rate and the exact cost the Town pays for the natural gas is passed onto the customer with no markup.
- **Federal Fuel:** This is the carbon levy applied by the Government of Canada and administered at a rate of \$2.10 per GJ of natural gas used (goes up to \$2.63 per GJ on April 1, 2022). This is another flowthrough cost that the Town does not control.
- Gas Distribution: This is the Town's portion of the bill and accounts for the administrative costs (\$35/month) plus distribution costs (\$1.57/GJ) of natural gas to residents. These are the rates set by Council in the Town's Utility Budget each year and have not increased since 2018.

Water & Sewer (Wastewater) Utility

- Water: This is the Town's charge for water usage by a property and accounts for the administrative cost (\$13.46/month) plus the cost of water used (\$1.55/m³).
- Sewer: This is the Town's charge for sewer usage by a property and accounts for the administrative costs (\$35/month) plus the cost of water used (\$1.85/m³).
- Storm Water Drainage: This is a flat charge of \$8 per month to a property that goes to fund drainage infrastructure projects and prevent potential flood events within the community

Many residents have asked why water and wastewater are separated out as utilities and this is simply because the revenues generated by each go to support the operations of each facility at the Town (Water & Wastewater Treatment Plants).

Waste & Recycling

Solid Waste: This is the cost associated with year-round weekly waste and recycling pickup, weekly organics pickup during the spring/summer months and bi-weekly organics pickup during the fall/ winter months. This also includes the Large Item Pick Up event the Town runs in the spring and fall.


Examples of support through the DEP include helping small businesses build their online presence, adding eCommerce, creating a social media plan and other digital practices to help businesses thrive.

Bring your bags starting April 4, 2022

Many residents may recall on Jan. 1, 2020, the Town implemented a Single-Use Plastic Retail Bag Bylaw to reduce single-use plastic waste

in our landfill. The Bylaw was relaxed later that year due to the uncertainties associated with Covid-19.

With one of Devon's local grocery chains taking the step to stop distributing plastic bags last year, the Town has set a date of **Monday, April 4, 2022**, for local businesses to use up their bag stock and get back on track with reducing plastic waste in our community.

Reusable bags available at the Town Office

Residents looking for some extra reusable bags are invited to drop by the Town of Devon Office during regular business hours (Mon-Fri, 8:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.) and pick up a reusable bag. Bags will be distributed on a first come, first served basis, and limited to 2 per household.

Local Businesses will begin phasing out plastic bags on April 4th, 2022
